**Objectives:** Children learn basic acting techniques (creating stage pictures, actor's space, focus, rhythm, verbal/non-verbal communication, balance, and coordination) through theater exercises, storytelling, and play-making, costumes, movement, and music.

Literacy Skills: Interactive storytelling engages the student actors in learning the characters and plot, then using instructorguided improvisation, students will recreate & perform the story.

Overview: The instructor uses theater games to teach basic acting techniques based on literary works. Students are provided with costume pieces and basic props that represent their characters and used to retell the story. Please see the class timeline listed on the website.
